FROM YOUR MINISTER

Grace and Peace to you,

I have a favorite week in the church—a week that I love more than any other: Holy Week.

I have always found a deep sense of the Divine during Holy Week. There is something about its ebb and flow, how it holds the entirety of human life, death, and the promise of resurrection so carefully and tenderly.

I do have a favorite day during Holy Week: Good Friday. I have never admitted that this day is my favorite, because it feels a bit sick and twisted to confess such a belief. Good Friday is anything but good. It is fraught with an incredibly complex history, which includes things like substitutional atonement, moral influence, and ransom theory, along with a good dose of potential Anti-Semitism. These ideas are not why I am drawn to Good Friday. (Call me a heretic, but I am not sure any of them speak to the truth of Good Friday).

Instead, Good Friday arrives and reminds me every year of death.

Death is that thing that so many of us are uncomfortable talking about. We are scared to mention it. We don't want to bring it up among good company. Some of us carry the real remnants of death in our grief. And we are careful about when and where we open that part of ourselves. Some of us worry and wonder about others experience of grief. I hear people ask me, "I never know what to say." "I don't know what to do." "I don't know how I can help." "I don't know how to make them feel better." People get tangled up in words and good intentions when death/grief comes up.

There is so much unknown surrounding death, while at the same time, it (along with change) is the only thing in our life guaranteed to happen. Even for Christ.

Friends, the reason why I am so drawn to Good Friday is that it makes hope possible. We cannot have Easter Sunday without Good Friday. We cannot sing "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" without first singing "Were You There?"

There would be something missing if our faith bypassed Good Friday and only celebrated Easter Sunday. Just like, there would be something lost if we did not have grief alongside hope. Easter Sunday without Good Friday feels empty. Hope without grief feels vacant.

Good Friday allows grief and hope to be tangled together in ways that do not entirely make sense. It is the moment of ultimate in-between where we are mourning what was and not yet welcomed into what waits to be. And so much of our lives is lived in this space. So much of our lives are spent in moments when we are held between what was and what we cannot see. But those are the places where promise and life are born—echoing that beautiful hymn, "Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see."

We can never escape Good Friday, friends. We must go through it. And when we do, we find ourselves on the other side, on Easter Sunday.

Much love to you, my friends and fellow travelers, as we make our way together through Good Friday to Easter Sunday.



COUNCIL MINUTES

Pilgrim UCC Council Meeting—February 10, 2025 APPROVED COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

Present: Carrie Britt, Geoff Nauth, Rev. Ashley Nolte, Marilyn Linde, Beth Eernisse, Dave Nestler, Nick Sancomb,

Jill Timmerman Absent: none

Set Next Meeting Date: Tuesday, March 18, 6:30 p.m.

Centering Moment: Ashley – blessing for new council and program year. Welcome new members Marilyn Linde and Nick Sancomb to Council.

Approval of January Minutes: Special note. Minutes were not available during meeting time. Minutes were subsequently emailed to council members for review. Jill motioned to approve. Beth seconded. Minutes approved via email vote.

Treasurer's Report -

- Giving/Income Regular giving for January totaled \$19k. This is \$8k under the same period last year and \$10k under budget for the month. It should be noted though that we have changed our accounting practices for recording larger prepaid pledges received during 2025. Any payments over \$5k are now being booked to the Prepaid Account and those funds will be amortized over the course of the year. Factoring out the impact of that change, we would be close to where we started in January 2024.
- Endowments fund values were up \$10k in January
- Operating Expenses on budget
 - * Operating expenses to highlight:
 - Continuing Education payment of \$1k
 - New property insurance is now paid quarterly and hence is over budget by \$2k
 - Building maintenance was under budget by \$1k
 - Payroll was under budget by \$2k. Church will be fully staffed as of February
- Summary
 - * From a pure Operating income/expense perspective, we report a \$15k loss in January.

Motion to approve Treasurer's Report as presented was made by Nick and seconded by Marilyn. Treasurer's report approved.

Pastor's Report

Pastor's report reviewed and discussed. No questions or concerns. Report is available upon request. Ashley will be participating in the Ministers Financial Vitality Initiative (UCC program). Council approved sharing of the church's budget as part of that program.

Old Business

Nothing to attend to at this meeting

- Building and Assets
 - Reviewing request for upgrade to coffee maker (funds to come from Memorials)
 - * New lift requires that a knock box be added. In progress.
 - * Building locks are being changed. More keys added and locks will all be keyed the same. In progress.
 - New insurer requires an update to fire alarm system. In review. Sidewalk extension is still in discussion. Waiting on weather and bids.
- Staffing Emma Lucht joined in Children's Ministry team effective February 2025.
 - * Other staff doing well
- Finance no additions beyond Treasurer's report
- Not-For-Profit Security Grant application was updated and resubmitted in November.
 - * No feedback expected prior to April 2025.

New Business

- Further discussion regarding change in status of churches as a "safe space". Wisconsin Council of churches position is that when the church is open it is a public space and ICE cannot be denied access to public areas within the church. In the event that ICE should arrive with a warrant, Ashley will review protocol for handling.
- Discussed who we are as Pilgrim Church and as part of the greater community of faith and how to best function given the current political climate.

CAREGIVERS / INCLUSION



This will be the last article I will be submitting to our Pilgrim newsletter. During this past year, I have offered you many resources and techniques to consider as a way of bringing you more peace in your days.

Today, we will talk about how a little bit of gratitude goes a long way. We will also talk about how reflecting on our actions throughout the day can remind us of how we are all

interconnected.

Let me ask you a question. What if, instead of habitual mind chatter (which we all have), the background of our consciousness was a constant, soft thank you? This is not merely positive thinking, as we have discussed in the past. As author Mary Davies states "This is our soul in conversation with an abundant universe, expressing gratitude for the infinite miracles that surround us all the time. It's like floating in a sea of awe. It's like lying on your back under a sky of thanksgiving." Even times of pain and suffering can be seen with awareness of the divine. It depends of which eyes we use to see. Some people keep a gratitude journal so that they intentionally begin to note the small things that bless their day.

Another way of finding joy is to reflect of how our daily actions or interactions with others have benefited another person. This does not have to be a big action. Small actions, as small as lifting someone up in prayer, count. It could be a smile or help in opening a door for someone. Or, as a caregiver, gently calming your loved one when they become agitated. Again, you have to be alert to note these interactions but when you do, you will notice that we are all interconnected and that we need each other.

That being said, I am here for you if you are a caregiver and you need a person to voice your frustrations and fears to. Remember the Caregiver Coffees are also a great venue for that. If your situation is more complex, please call the ADRC at 262-284-8120 and talk to the Caregiver Specialist there. She will guide you in what is best for your own unique situation.

"Earth Day inspired 20 million Americans at the time, 10% of the total population of the United States, to take to streets, parks, and auditoriums to demonstrate against the impact of 150 years of industrial development, which had left a growing legacy of serious human health impacts.

By the end of 1970, the first earth day led to the creation of the **United States Environmental Protection Agency** and the passage of other first-of-their-kind environmental laws, including the National Environmental Education Act, the Occupational Safety and Health Act, and the Clean Air Act.

Two years later, the Congress passed the "Clean Water Act."
