Pilgrim's Progress

One of my best friend's favorite literary character growing up was named Anne Shirley. She was the main character in the series *Anne of Green Gables*. In her first year on Prince Edward Island, she was astounded by autumn:

October was a beautiful month at Green Gables, when the birches in the hollow turned as golden as sunshine and the maples behind the orchard were royal crimson and the wild cherry trees along the lane put on the loveliest shades of dark red and bronzy green, while the fields sunned themselves in aftermaths..."Oh, Marilla," she exclaimed one Saturday morning, coming dancing in with her arms full of gorgeous boughs, "I'm so glad I live in a world where there are Octobers."

I am so glad I live in a world where there are Octobers.

According to meteorologists, we should be hitting "peak color" in our area of Southeastern Wisconsin in the last part of the month. As Anne indicates, this season is especially beautiful. The trees, urged by the shortening daylight, stop producing chlorophyll. Through this process, the leaves no longer absorb sunlight, and they die. (This is a gross underestimation of an incredibly complex process).

Autumn occurs for us in the Northern hemisphere in October and November. Also, in October and November, we have our annual traditions of Halloween, Samhain, Dia de los Muertos, and All Saints Day. All these traditions, in their own way, mark the end of life. They also occur (not ironically), the same time the trees show us what it is to let go and die.

This sounds terribly morbid when it is written like that. But I find that the trees in October remind us, vividly, of that season of our life that is often feared: dying.

In the church, we talk about death a lot—although it is often passively referenced in Jesus' death, during prayers, and at funerals. And, then, it is something to be mourned. In our wider culture, aging is something to be 'fixed' through makeup, hair color, Botox, and surgery. Or, we apologize for it—often heard in comments, such as, "Sorry, I am getting old," or, "I am not as young as I used to be." And death and aging become a problem to be solved.

But in our faith tradition, it is not a problem to be solved—it is something we are invited to accept, honor, and respect. Jesus did not try to solve the problem of his death on the cross. He did not try to apologize to those who died beside him. Instead, he entered this season of his life willingly and without apology.

As I sit here, looking at the trees, some of them have started to change. None of them seem to be burned by it. They surely don't seem to fight with the loss of chlorophyll; they just let it happen. And when they do, they are stunning. And we are caught off guard by their beauty—sometimes so much that it moves us to awe at how beautiful they are—even and especially in their dying.

I am glad we live in a world where there are Octobers. In this season, we are offered the gentle reminder that letting go and aging IS beautiful. Surely, we know and love the color of October as much as we love the color of May. Surely, we know they are different—both good and beautiful in their own ways.

Wherever we are in our life seasons, we will make our way through this month of October. And the natural world will preach to us of the beauty of this season of letting go.

The Human Side of Cancer

Cancer touches nearly everyone, either directly or indirectly. In 2025, it's estimated that over 19 million people globally will be diagnosed with some form of cancer, and more than 10 million lives will be lost to the disease. In the United States alone, over 2 million new cases are expected, with more than 600,000 deaths. These numbers serve as a powerful reminder of why cancer awareness is so important—not just for prevention and treatment, but for compassion and support.

There are many types of cancer, each with its own challenges. Among the most common are breast, prostate, lung, colorectal, and skin cancers. Breast cancer remains the most frequently diagnosed, while lung cancer continues to be the leading cause of cancer-related deaths worldwide. Other types, such as pancreatic, liver, and leukemia, often present more aggressively and can be harder to treat. Understanding these differences helps us better support those facing a diagnosis and encourages early detection, which can be life-saving.

But cancer is more than a medical condition. For those diagnosed, the experience can be overwhelming. Many face not only physical symptoms and side effects from treatment, but also emotional challenges like fear, anxiety, and depression. The road to recovery can be long and uncertain, and even after treatment ends, survivors often grapple with lasting changes to their bodies, their routines, and their sense of self.

Families and friends of cancer patients are also profoundly affected. Caregivers often take on demanding roles – managing medications, attending appointments, and offering emotional support—all while coping with their own feelings of worry and grief. Studies show that spouses and close family members are at increased risk for mental health struggles, especially in the first year after diagnosis. It's a reminder that cancer doesn't just impact one person.

That's why awareness matters. It's not just about statistics or symptoms—it's about empathy, education, and action. By talking openly about cancer, we reduce stigma and encourage early screening. By supporting research, we move closer to better treatments and cures. And by standing with those affected—patients, survivors, caregivers—we remind them they're not alone.

Approval of Meeting Minutes: Reviewed draft minutes from June's meeting. No corrections/updates proposed. Beth motioned to approve. Marilyn seconded. Minutes approved.

Treasurer's Report

Incoming

Regular giving totaled \$27k for June and \$29k for July. These amounts do not include the summer appeal. In total, this is \$13k over the same period last year. Overall giving is under budget by \$14k YTD. The summer appeal has collected \$13k so for to help close this gap.

Endowment fund values were up \$29k in June/July and are up \$38k year to date.

Outgoing

June and July's overall Operating Expenses were \$23k and \$29k, respectively. In total, this was \$7k under budget. Building Maintenance was under budget \$3k in total in June and July.

Summary

From a pure Operating income/expense perspective, we report a \$5k gain for June and a \$12k gain in July (including the summer appeal special giving). After running at a YTD loss all year, after July, we report a \$1k gain.

Marilyn motioned to approve Treasurer's Report as presented and motion was seconded by Jill. Treasurer's report approved.

Pastor's Report

Pastor's report reviewed and discussed. Items of note:

Ashley is considering starting a weekly Monday am scripture chat in the fall.

Also considering a Wednesday night Bible study group.

JOB DESCRIPTION

Mission Director Job Description

<u>Principal Function</u>: The mission director is a valuable member of the church staff. The mission director is responsible for coordinating and maintaining all church mission projects and communication with pastor, staff, and members.

Position Type:

Part-time; 10 hours per week, not to exceed 520 hours per calendar year

Payroll; Monthly Flexible Schedule Annual Review

Essential Duties and Responsibilities:

Prepare and oversee yearly national missions such as OGHS, Strengthening the Church, Neighbors in Need, etc.

Provide guidance and mentoring to coordinators regarding timelines and logistics of each mission project such as St. Bens, Habitat for Humanity, Mr. Bob's Under the Bridge, Mt. Horeb, and all seasonal and ongoing projects

Prepare weekly bulletin blurbs and monthly newsletter articles for Pilgrim's Progress

Keep connected with Church World Services and other mission organizations

The Mission Director facilitates the Mission Team of volunteers, which includes providing direction, planning, and giving reports in a regular manner and reports to Church Council as needed.

Effective communication connecting the mission team through meetings, emails, and personal contact with team members and recruiting for new members

Periodically report results of past projects to congregation

Explore additional areas for mission work and assign a coordinator to facilitate

Coordinates domestic and international adult mission trips

Keep missions bulletin board current
