Grace and peace to all of you

Here we are in Lent.

We in the church have embarked on a season of prayerful work: Some of us are in the midst of *fasting*; at Pilgrim, we are in the season of *Wednesday Lenten meals and services*; some of us have embarked on *personal prayer practices*. It is a season that is often marked with intentional and faithful work. Most of this work is done in the quiet of our hearts, which means *most of it is unseen*.

I wondered this year what it would be like to celebrate the work of Lent in a different way—to not just turn inward towards the Divine, but to share pieces of our work and our lives with each other. *Especially the work that often goes unseen*.

Work often carries a negative connotation. It is something that we must do. It is a duty. It is a requirement to survive in the world today. But that does not describe all work. Some work is done not out of duty, but out of joy, because we CAN do it—not simply because we must. Most of the practices we engage during this season of Lent fall into this category. I do not HAVE to give up meat, but I do. You don't HAVE to give up sweets, but you do. We do these things not out of necessity, but out of value. This value is not monetary; instead, it is personal.

And this work, the work that is done because we can do it, offers a different tenor and tone. There is a sense of mystery, creativity, joy, and foolishness in it. I have always felt that this work lives at the heart of the season of Lent.

This year, especially during our Wednesday night services, we will be exploring this kind of work. Work that is pure offering. We will dance with David, we will pray at the burning bush with Moses, we will hold love. *But we will also celebrate the work of our hands*.

I have invited members and friends of Pilgrim (that is all of you) to bring in the work of your hands to display at the front table of the sanctuary this season. Already, people have brought in quilts, afghans, cards, calligraphy, paintings, woodworking, model cars, photographs, tapestries, LEGOs, and so much more. And, our sanctuary is being filled with the work we CAN do. *The work our hands and hearts find joy in completing*.

We still have room and time for you to bring in your work so that you can share it with us at Pilgrim. We have decided to place these pieces at the front of the church so that they might live as an offering. Especially during this season of Lent, this kind of offering is as important as our financial offerings because it speaks to the work we do out of pure love and joy. It is the work we do that mirrors the creative actions of God—from out of nothing comes something. From out of the darkness comes light. From out of the empty tomb comes life.

The movement of Lent is the most creative and imaginative work God has ever done. This Lent, we offer the creative work of our hands as a testament of God's continued presence in this world. If we are creating through painting, woodworking, sewing, crafting, LEGOing, photographing—God is, too.

*Let us not keep this work unseen.
Instead, let us make visible all the beautiful things
God has done and will continue to do—
especially in this season of Lent.*

For those without Bluetooth hearing aids, but still would like some hearing assistance, we have the *FM broadcast hearing loop* for your use. Come see us in the tech booth and we will get you all set up.





The WISE team would like to thank the Pilgrim community for deciding to become a WISE congregation during last month’s annual meeting. We ask for your continued prayers as we strive to make Pilgrim a more welcoming and supportive church to all.

As we begin the next steps and start implementing the ideas we’ve been working on, we would like to share some information on three community organizations that offer resources and support for those dealing with a variety of mental health issues.

NAMI Ozaukee (National Alliance on Mental Illness)

NAMI is a non-profit, volunteer, family based organization in Grafton that offers education, support, and advocacy, in addition to help finding proper care for family members. NAMI offers a quarterly newsletter, programs with speakers, a library covering mental health topics, and a resource guide to help families navigate the mental health care system. NAMI is also involved with CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) and CIP (Crisis Intervention Partners), which is a partnership between law enforcement, mental health professionals, and families to help while responding to people with mental health challenges.

Ozaukee Family Services

Ozaukee Family Services is a non-profit agency in Cedarburg with the mission of “building mental wellness and strengthening families.” Their services fall into four categories: Behavioral Health, Family Education and Support, Prevention Education, and Senior Services. Some of the behavioral health services include counseling, coordinated services teams, and youth groups. Ozaukee Family Services covers all of Ozaukee County, and most programs are offered free or at a nominal fee.

Ozaukee County Behavioral Health is a county run agency in Port Washington that offers programming for mental health and substance use concerns. They offer crisis intervention, case management services, outpatient mental health and substance use disorder services, and an intoxicated driver program.

APPROVED COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

Next Meeting Date: Monday, February 16, 6:30pm

Approval of Meeting Minutes: Minor correction required. Nick motioned to approve as corrected. Marilyn seconded. Minutes approved.

Treasurer's Report

Incoming

Regular giving for December totaled \$35k. This was the highest giving month of the year. Giving was \$13k over the same period last year and also \$5k over budget. Overall giving is under budget by \$8k YTD. Another \$5k was received in December towards the summer appeal bringing this total to \$29k YTD, surpassing the budget gap
Endowment fund values were up \$1k in December and are up \$69k YTD.

Outgoing

December operating expenses were \$35k which was \$2k over budget. Publicity was over budget by \$6k with the mailing of the Christmas postcards. This was partially offset by the following line items that were under budget: payroll by \$2k, building maintenance by \$1k, property insurance by \$1k.

Summary

From a pure Operating income/expense perspective, we report \$5k income in December. Year-to-date we report \$35k of income – without the \$29k of summer appeal we would only report \$6k of income YTD.

Jill motioned to approve the Treasurer's report. Seconded by Nick. Report approved.

Pastor's Report – Reviewed submitted written report. No questions from the Council.

Committee Liaisons

Building and Assets – Pending project report has been submitted for council review. Reflects both projects under investigation plus those with target dates for 2026 through 2028. Under consideration for 2026:

- HVAC ventilation issue in sanctuary

- AC unit replacement

- Completion of Hearing Assistance project for sanctuary

- Replace flooring in Kalweit hall

- Finance – no updates beyond Treasurer's report

- Staff – Treasurer position is still in flux. Mission Director position remains open.

Old Business

Pilgrim UCC Constitution Revision – Geoff submitted final changes to the constitution (adding section RE emergency expenditures and replacing references to SE Association with SE Conference. Nick motioned to accept the finalized changes and Beth seconded. Motion passed.

WISE team – covenant will be submitted for congregational approval at annual meeting.

New Business

2026 Treasurers – Discussions with potential candidates continues.

Hearing Assist Proposal - Final proposal has been submitted to Council for approval. Marilyn motioned to approve. Motion seconded by Nick. Project approved.

Congregational meeting –
