Grace and peace to all of you

Resurrection happened in an instant. *It was within a single moment when the breathless body of Jesus took a deep inhale and was ushered back to life.*

The resurrection may have happened in a moment, but it will take hours and days for the disciples to catch up. It will take weeks for Thomas. At first, they will be stunned. Then they will be confused. Then they will try and make sense of what they have experienced. Then they will grieve. They will probably rejoice while they grieve. They will spend the rest of their lives trying to understand this single moment. A moment that is so simple: the one who was dead is now alive—it should be easy. But as the historian Thomas Fuller once said, "All things are difficult before they are easy."

Including resurrection.

We will spend 40 days following Easter Sunday, April 5, following the disciples, who are trying to understand just what happened in that tomb. We will meet their doubt. We will meet their fear. We will meet their joy. We will meet their uncertainty. We will walk with them as they experience a world that is different. And this post-resurrection world will be difficult for them.

This is important for us to remember.

It is easy to believe that in that moment of resurrection, the world became easy—it didn't. In fact, it became dangerous for the disciples. It remained difficult for the early church. We see this in Paul's letters to the early church to congregations that were riddled with in-fighting and conflict. Disagreements over practices, such as baptism and circumcision, splintered communities. Eventually, the church would split between the East and the West because they could not agree on the language of prayers and blessings, nor could they agree on the 'correct' day of Easter (Orthodox Easter will be celebrated on April 12). Even in the modern church, the differences between denominations and congregations are stark. *All this complexity occurred because of a single moment in the quiet of the tomb.*

Resurrection happened in a moment, but to understand what it meant, means, and *will mean* for the created world (galaxies and stars included) will take ages.

We have not yet discovered all the grace and beauty cracked open in that single moment in the tomb. We have not yet uncovered all the goodness of God. We have not yet found the boundaries of God's love. This is why we are called back every year,



to take our place with a woman named Mary, to encounter a man who was simply breathing. We are called to a garden to remember a single instance, and spend the rest of our lives trying to understand just what it means. And every year, we will be met with the same simple assurance, "**Christ is risen. Christ is risen indeed.**" What is simple balm—in a difficult world.

Happy Easter, friends. Christ is risen. Christ is risen indeed!

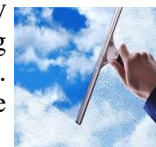

Navigating Life Transitions

Most people have experienced transitions in their lives. As a community of faith, we are invited to support people through many seasons of change. Here are some of the ways we can support people as they experience change.



New parents are often nervous coming to church with an infant or children. We can sit next to them, introduce ourselves, and ask if there is any way we can be helpful. Young parents have most likely struggled to physically arrive at church. **We can let them know that they and their children belong in this community.**

People who are newly single are often nervous about coming to church alone. We can offer to sit with them in church. The key word here is *offer* as some people may prefer to sit alone. We can reach out via phone calls, text messages, and letters. **We can let them know that they belong in this community.**

People who are transitioning between employment positions are often nervous about changes. We can ask how they are feeling and listen to their responses. We can listen and not try and look for solutions for them. If they ask for help, we can ask questions about what they might need in the upcoming days. **We can let them know that they belong in this community.**

People who are transitioning into retirement are often excited! We can celebrate with them! We inquire about goals or plans they are looking forward to. We can remind them that they are more than the sum of what they can produce or accomplish. We can provide them with a welcoming space to just exist. We can also invite them to engage in service within the congregation and community *when they are ready!* **We can let them know that they belong in this community.**

For those navigating transitions, oftentimes the world feels unsteady and the ground you walk on uncertain. In moments when feelings of disorientation, fear, grief, or anxiety arise, let it. Let yourself feel all of those feelings. When you are ready, consider making a daily routine. Each morning/evening, consider making a routine of a few small acts, such as brushing your teeth, combing your hair, washing your face, putting on a pair of slippers, and possibly repeating a favorite prayer or phrase like the Serenity Prayer: *Grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can and the wisdom to know the difference."*

You belong in this community.

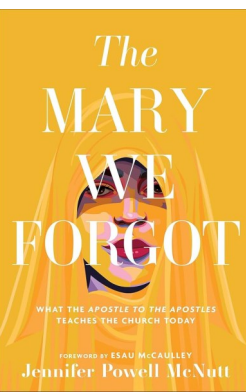

Treasurer's Report

Incoming

Regular giving for January totaled \$19k. This is even with the same period last year and \$10k under budget for the month.

We received \$9k of Prepaid Pledges in January.

Other financial information for the month – Endowment fund values were up \$9k in January.

Outgoing

January's overall Operating Expenses were \$33k. This was right on budget.

Operating expenses to highlight:

The property insurance is paid quarterly and hence is over budget by (\$2k).

Building maintenance was under budget by \$1k.

Summary

From a pure Operating income/expense perspective, we report a \$13k loss in January.

Amber motioned to approve the Treasurer's report. Seconded by Dave. Report approved.

Pastor's Report – Reviewed submitted written report. No questions from the Council.

Committee Liaisons

Building and Assets – The BA have not met since the last council meeting. The hearing assist device support system has been installed and is up and running in the sanctuary. In order to use the system via Bluetooth, the app WaveCast must be down loaded by individuals. The tech team is available on Sunday mornings to assist with the set up for individuals.

Finance – no updates beyond Treasurer's report

Staff – We are still looking for a Mission Team Director. A word of thanks to Jill Timmerman, Donna Tredrea, and Cherie Burton, who are filling in some necessary roles on the mission team as we still try and fill the position.
